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**Local Law Student Recognized With
Hintz Family Scholarship for Community Service**

(VENTURA, CA – October 19, 2009) — Ventura and Santa Barbara Colleges of Law student Kathleen Barrett has been awarded the prestigious Hintz Family Scholarship for Community Service. Donated by the Judge Steven Hintz family, the award was established in 2005 to recognize a significant commitment to community service on behalf of a local law student.

Barrett is scheduled to complete her Juris Doctor degree at the Colleges of Law in December. While attending law school she has been involved as a volunteer with Grey Law of Ventura County, a nonprofit group that provides free legal help to senior citizens. She also works as a volunteer mediator and mediation supervisor in a small claims mediation program sponsored by the Ventura County Superior Court and the Ventura Center for Dispute Settlement. In addition, she volunteers as a court-appointed guardian ad litem in juvenile dependency court, helping abused, neglected or other at-risk children, and assists a local attorney with pro bono child custody and child support cases.

"Kathleen Barrett exemplifies America's call to volunteerism," Judge Hintz said in presenting the award. "The Santa Barbara and Ventura Colleges of Law is to be commended for requiring community service as part of their law degree program."

Barrett entered the Santa Barbara and Ventura Colleges of Law following a four-decade career in health care management. "My hope was to use the law as a way to channel my energy into helping others," she said. "I can truly say that entering law school was the best decision I ever made as it has provided many varied avenues for me to pursue my commitment to be of service to my community."

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Barrett says that upon graduation her goals are to pass the bar and “devote my time to pro bono legal service. I’ve been incredibly fortunate in my lifetime; and I hope, as an attorney, to do some small part to help those who have not been as fortunate.”

According to Law School Dean Heather Georgakis, service to others, professional responsibility and civic duty are “important ingredients in the law profession” and are “stressed throughout a student’s curriculum at the college. We are proud of all of our graduates over the past 40 years who are now making important contributions and helping to make their communities a better and more just place to live,” she said.

Currently celebrating its 40th anniversary, the Santa Barbara and Ventura Colleges of Law offers a State Bar-accredited part-time evening program leading to the awarding of a Juris Doctor degree and academic eligibility to sit for the California State Bar Examination. With a faculty comprised of working professionals who bring real-world experience into the curriculum, its classes are taught in a supportive and practical learning environment that encourages students to fulfill their dreams while adhering to the highest levels of ethics, professional responsibility and civic duty. 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**Local Attorney Honored by Women Lawyers of Ventura County
for Commitment to Others and Providing “Access to Justice”**

(VENTURA, CA – November 2, 2009) — Gabriella Navarro-Busch, a graduate of the Santa Barbara and Ventura Colleges of Law and local champion of immigration and civil rights law, has been honored by Women Lawyers of Ventura County with the prestigious Holly Spevak Memorial Award.

Named in remembrance of Ventura College of Law alumna Holly Grace Spevak, the annual award honors an attorney who exemplifies a commitment to serve others and provide “access to justice” through pro-bono work in the same spirit of Spevak who died in 2007. Last year’s recipient, Deborah Jurgensen, is also a graduate of the Santa Barbara and Ventura Colleges of Law.

Since 2001, Navarro-Busch has been practicing immigration and civil rights law and has assisted many individuals and families facing deportation orders. She donates considerable time in her law practice to pro bono work, including helping women who are victims of domestic violence. Navarro-Busch is a former president of the Ventura County chapter of the Mexican-American Bar Association and sits of the boards of California Rural Legal Assistance and the Ventura County Bar Association. Over recent years she has also served as mentor to interns from the Santa Barbara and Ventura Colleges of Law.

In 2004 Navarro-Busch was awarded the State Bar of California President's Pro Bono Service award for donating more than 700 hours of pro bono legal services. Seven of the past ten recipients of this award are graduates of the Santa Barbara and Ventura Colleges of Law, which stresses a commitment to “service to others” throughout its curriculum.
